


# DuPage Veterans Foundation 2020 Chicago Honor Flight Fundraiser Postponed

When Corrie Ten Boom's faith and courage stood up strongly in the face of Nazi tyranny during WWII, she was often heard to say to those around her that worry doesn't empty tomorrow of its sorrows, it empties today of its strength! Over each of our lifetimes 90% of what we worry about or become panicked over never

happens, the other 10% is out of our control. It also takes the same amount of energy to worry as it does to pray. One leads to peace, the other to panic. We have the choice of which action will determine our result. Peter in 1Peter 3:17 encourages us to press on in the midst of every evil, whether they be persecutions or pandemics like the one we are facing now. God calls us to face troubles and threats with courage leaning on him. Throughout history Christians and all persons of faith have always stood out willing to help those who are sick, poor or in need of encouragement when the world seems to not make sense or desert them in terms of uncertainty or crisis. This is such a time to demonstrate our faith, love and compassion to our families, our co-workers and to friends and strangers alike. Now, I don't want to appear naive. Loving the sick doesn't mean we intentionally infect ourselves with the coronavirus contagion but it does mean we should take practical steps in hygiene, staying away from large groups and if necessary self-isolate if we might have the flu, bad cold or other non-virulent virus. However, if we are well we can reach out to the sick, the lonely or infirmed by being quick to help and slow to hiding in our basements. Noted pastor Greg Laurie told his congregation this week: 1) Be practical about hygiene and safety, 2) Be prayerful for God's protection. God is BIGGER than the Covid-19 virus, and 3) Spread God's love and compassion by being faithful and not fearful. Don't worry, pray and replace fear with faith. Throughout history there have been plagues and pestilences far worse than what we are currently facing. However, the United States government has been slow in the production and distribution of testing kits, which are important of knowing who has the virus, so the virus can be better controlled. As of March 13th China has tested 370,000 of its citizens, South Korea 248,000, Italy 86,000, Russia 77,000, Britain 30,000, Taiwan 16,000, Japan 10,000 and the United States has tested only 13,624 of its citizens. Since the outbreak of the virus there have been to date 1,750 reported US cases with 50 deaths. The worldwide count is 137,445 cases, of which 80,945 are from China, 15,113 from Italy, and 11,364 cases in Iran. Deaths resulting from the virus are just under 5,000 as of March 13th, the day I am writing this article to you. Symptoms of the virus are: a temperature of 100.4 or above. That's right not 104 but 100.4, dry cough, fatique and thick mucus coughed up from the respiratory track. This information provided by the CDC. The virus can survive on hard surfaces like plastic and stainless steel for 72 hours, only 24 hours on cardboard. The virus is not an airborne virus says the CDC. One can only be infected by touching a surface or coming into contact with an infected person. Use hand sanitizer with at least 40-60% alcohol base. Finally, an encouraging sign may lie not far ahead. Many viruses become less transmissible when the temperature and humidity rise and eventually die out. The virus, says the CDC, will not live long on heated surfaces. So, since Spring will have already started by the time you read this, we can be optimistic and hopeful that the days of the Coronavirus may be numbered particularly with the testing, sanitary protocols and reduction in large group gatherings; as well as temporary closures of schools and events to further control the spreading of the virus. Keep faithful and hopeful and recognize that God is still in control! In closing here are some facts also from the CDC you may have missed. Unrelated to COVID-19, the CDC estimates that between October 2019 and March 2020, 36 to 51 million people will be treated for flu related illness with 370,000 to 670,000 requiring hospitalization. 22,000-55,000 deaths occur from just the regular flu each year. It's been much worse before the Coronavirus appeared. During WWII, more soldiers died from the Spanish Flu Pandemic of 1918, than were killed in the entire war! The 1918 flu, when there were no antibiotics and medical treatments like we have today, killed an estimated 20-55 million people including 675,000 Americans. This deadliest of all viruses in history also resulted in 40% of all Navy and 36% of all Army soldiers to be infected with the flu. Troops moving around the world in crowded ships and trains helped to spread the virus. God Bless You All! God Bless The United States of America!

### 2019-2020: Period of Many Anniversaries

The past year has seen the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the official end of WWI with the signing of the Treaty of Versailles on June 28, 1919.

Earlier in that same year, a group of Veterans met in Paris to start discussions about forming what would become the American Legion. Similarly, in June, 1919, 15 Naperville Veterans came together to form American Legion Post 43, making 2019 a year of multiple 100-year anniversaries.

This year has its own milestones. On Feb. 19, 1945, the amphibious landings began on Iwo Jima. Some 70,000 U.S. Marines would eventually engage in the battle against a Japanese force of 18,000 soldiers, fighting from caves and bunkers dug into the island's volcanic rock. One of the bloodiest battles of the Pacific war, the fighting lasted until March 26, 1945. At its end, some 26,000 U.S. casualties were recorded, including 6,800 dead. Of the Japanese force, only 216 remained alive to surrender.

The iconic image of the battle of Iwo Jima, fought 75 years ago, was the photograph of five Marines and a Navy Corpsman raising the U.S. flag on the summit of Mount Suribachi. Although a broadly recognized symbol of victory, the flag raising actually occurred on Feb. 23, just four days after the landing and weeks before the battle's ending.

This year will also mark the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the end of WWII with the formal Japanese surrender on Sept. 2. 1945, on the deck of the USS Missouri, following the Japanese Emperor's surrender declaration of Aug. 15.



This month also contains significant dates in military history. On April 4, 1775, the "shot heard around the world" was fired by American colonists against British troops at the battle of Lexington and Concord, Mass., setting off the American Revolution.

Exactly eight years later in 1783 General George Washington declared the end of hostilities.

Also this month, the U.S. Civil War began in 1861 with the firing by Confederate forces on Fort Sumter, S. C., on the  $12^{th}$  of April. The Union garrison of 85 officers and men included Abner Doubleday, who is reputed to have fired the first shot and who is also credited with inventing the game of baseball in 1839.

April also marks the end of the Civil War. General Robert E. Lee surrendered to General Ulysses Grant at Appomattox, Va., on April 9, 1865.

There are other important April dates in military history, but one has particular significance for many Post 43 members. On April 30, 1975, Saigon fell to Communist forces and the last Americans evacuated South Vietnam via helicopters. These Americans remained in non-combat roles following the signing of a peace treaty between the U.S. and North Vietnam in January 1973.

If you have wondered about the importance of your DD-214, the attached link will get you to the VA - U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs which helps to provide the details and benefits your family will receive if you file a claim...WITHIN 2 YEARS OF VETERANS DEATH. See the link provided below for the explanation of your benefits.

The over-riding importance, however, you must have the DD-214 (or final discharge papers, if prior to DD-214) to request the benefits. Advise your family where your discharge papers are stored; and/or have a copy of your DD-214 (Discharge Documents) on file with Post 43.

This website describes veteran burial allowance/payments to the veterans family or "next of kin."
