COMMANDER'S CALL

Greetings Post 43 Legionaries:

We are all living in a world turned upside down right now. By the time this is published, I hope we are on the other side of the peak, and on the downward side. The Coronavirus outbreak is rapidly evolving and there are many concerns and questions that American Legion Family members have. The best resources are health agencies like the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the World Health Organization (WHO), and state and local health departments. The following key questions and answers about the Coronavirus have largely been assembled from the CDC website, the WHO website and elsewhere.



The flu happens every year. What's the big deal about the Coronavirus?

A person with the flu infects an average of 1.3 others. While health experts are still learning about Coronavirus, they estimate that each person with COVID-19 will infect between two and four other people. Simply put, COVID-19 is expected to escalate quickly, leading to a significant number of cases and deaths, especially among those who are elderly or have existing respiratory conditions.

Still, Coronavirus does not seem to be that fatal. How does it compare with the mortality rate for the flu?

Like the flu, older people (over age 50) are especially at risk. Same for those already in poor health. The World Health Organization estimates that the mortality rate of coronavirus is about 3.4 percent — around 100 times higher than flu. The mortality rate of coronavirus could range from 9 to 19 % for older people, especially those with cardiovascular disease, diabetes or have other health issues related to compromised immunity.

There are billions of people on the planet, so my risks of contracting Coronavirus are minimal. Correct?

The World Health Organization has determined Coronavirus to be a Pandemic. Health experts expect over 2 million people to be infected. With an estimated mortality rate as low as 2 percent, that translates to many thousands of deaths. Currently, there are over 165K deaths globally. In the US, experts estimate tens of thousands of cases. The death toll in the US is now over 40,000.

So, are we all supposed to hide in our homes until the threat passes?

Due to this virus, there have been large-scale cancellations of public events, sports competitions, business conferences, and celebrations and parades. Many schools and universities have moved to classes on online. The prevailing advice is to engage in "social distancing."

Because this virus is so contagious, limiting exposure to large groups of people will not only help protect you, but others around you, who might be at an elevated risk. That's why universities and schools are suspending classes for the remainder of this school year. This will help protect students and those more at-risk, such as faculty members, staff and others. Also, all Post 43 activities have been cancelled for the foreseeable future. By limiting the spread of the virus, we will not only save lives, but allow our health-care system to focus more resources on fewer people.





WINNERS OF CITIZENS OF THE YEAR AWARDS FOR 2020

Again this year Post 43 is recognizing people in three service categories:

Service to Community: Wayne Klein. "Simply the most selfless person I have ever met" is the way one person described Wayne. His service in the community is characterized by low key actions that don't grab the spotlight. Wayne coaches kid's athletic teams, organizes a memorial golf outing, worked as a Cub master, Scoutmaster, suggests Eagle Scout projects, consults on obtaining required city permits, and teaches Junior Achievement. Wane offered his construction company to build an outdoor classroom at a local elementary school, and uses his plane to fly medical missions. He is devoted to his family. Wayne is also involved in his community with positions on the facilities committee at All Saints Academy, he became president of the School Board, and now serves on the Board of Trustees. He has served on multiple committees and projects at his church, St. Elizabeth Seton.

Service to Veterans: James Oftedal. Jim is a member of both Post 43 and VFW Post 3873, where he serves as Chaplain. In 2015, Jim organized the joint Post 43 and Post 3873 Honor Guard, and serves as its Commander. He is a Viet Nam veteran, who lost three high school friends in that war. After months of training, the combined Post Honor Guard received the Department of Defense Certification, a significant achievement, in October 2015. Since that time, the Naperville Honor Guard has performed 235 Military Funeral Services (MFS) and numerous community service events (CSE). As HG Commander, Jim's tasks include coordination with the funeral home, notifying the HG members and ensuring a sufficient number are available, coordinating with the military flag folding team (and to perform that task if a military unit is not available), securing the rifles and returning them to the Post. He also notifies local police departments, and keeps the Post Commanders up-to-date on the Honor Guard activities. Each event requires a significant investment of his time.

Service to Youth: Sherry Weinstein. Over seventeen years ago, Sherry started a program for District 203 and 204 parents called "Keeping Kids Safe". It addressed bullying and other social situations. Over time it evolved to emphasize protecting children form online abuse such as cyber-bullying, sexting, sextortion The program was presented by Naperville Police Department and stalking. Internet Crimes Detective Rich Wistocki (now retired). The presentation was so popular that it was turned into a seminar so that parents who couldn't attend, might access the information online. Detective Wistocki presented the seminar at the Exchange Club's National Convention in 2017. The program was deemed so timely and urgent that the National Exchange Club posted the hour-long, professionally produced video on its website for its nationwide audience. To keep youth safe is the greatest service that can be performed, and Sherry has fulfilled that service to not only her own family's children but also the children of parents everywhere. She is a true unsung hero for the prevention of child abuse.

Two local students have been awarded \$5000 scholarships by Naperville American Legion Post 43.

Grace Lee, is an "A" student at Nequa Valley High School, scored an almost perfect 35 on the ACT, a curriculum-based education and career planning tool for high school students that assesses their mastery of college readiness standards. She is a National Merit Finalist, Indian Prairie Scholar and an IL State Scholar; but her accomplishments are not limited to academics. She won first place in the Speech Contest at Illinois American Legion Auxiliary Girls State, holds the President's Volunteer Service Award, Wildcat Pride Award, and ILMEA All-State Honors Band. She also volunteers at Naper Settlement and interned with IL State Senator Laura Ellman. Her essay on the Responsibilities of Citizenship focuses on the responsibility to vote. In keeping with its title Not a Spectator Sport, Grace voted in this year's Illinois primary election and demonstrated her commitment to lead by her membership on the Executive Board of KA Voice, a nationwide volunteer organization that promotes Korean American civic awareness.

Claire Yu attends Naperville Central High School, where she carries a cumulative weighted grade point average of 4.7, and is the Student Ambassador to the District 203 Board of Education. An accomplished musician, she played a piano solo at the Weil Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall in New York City. But her musical interests go beyond being a soloist. As a member of the Chicago Youth Symphony Orchestra, she has collaborated in trio, quartet, and quintet settings to study the scores of Schumann and Beethoven beyond what is written on the surface level. Claire is very active in organizations at Naperville Central, where she is Editor-in-Chief of Literary Magazine, President of the Urban Arts Club, and of Junior State of America. Claire's essay on the Responsibilities of Citizenship discusses the need to recognize your weakness, but focus on your strengths, compromise, and give voice to those whose voices have been silenced. She has been accepted by her dream school, Stanford University.

May has Many Reasons to Remember

This month, of course, we observe Memorial Day and honor those who made the ultimate sacrifice. Originally known as Decoration Day, it was first observed on May 5, 1865, with the decoration of Civil War soldiers' graves. While Memorial Day is central, this month includes other significant dates in military history.

For example, on May 8, 1856, the first regular engagement of the Mexican War (1846-1848) took place. General Zachary Taylor defeated the forces of General Mariano Arista at Palo Alto, Texas. The engagement actually took place prior to President James Polk's formal declaration of war on May 13, 1846.

The first Union soldier to fall during the Civil War, Bailey T. Brown, died on May, 22, 1861. He was a member of the 2nd West Virginia Volunteer Infantry.

The U.S. Army 1st Division opened the first offensive assault by an American unit during WWI by capturing the French village of Cantigny from German forces on May 28, 1918.

On May 7, 1942, the first naval battle fought entirely without ships being in sight of one another took place in the Battle of the Coral Sea.

Also in 1942 Congress authorized women to enlist for non-combat duties, creating on May 14 the Women's Auxiliary Army Corps (WAAC), Women Appointed for Voluntary Emergency Service (WAVES), Women's Auxiliary Ferrying Squadron (WAFS), Semper Paratus Always Ready Service (SPARS) and the Women's Reserve of the Marine Corps.

On May 5, 1961, Commander Alan Shepard, Jr., became the first American in space, flying in the Freedom 7 capsule some 300 miles at a speed of 15,000 mph at an altitude of 115 miles.

During the Vietnam War, two pilots from USS Constellation, flying an F-4 Phantom II became the first aces of the war, shooting down three Mig 17's on May 10, 1972.

Nine years ago on May 2, U.S. Special Operations Forces found and killed Osama bin Laden at his compound in Abbott bad, Pakistan. The attack culminated the hunt for the architect of the 9/11 attacks, which killed some 3,000 people at New York's World Trade Center, the Pentagon and a Pennsylvania field.
