This amount increases to \$5000 if you are on American Legion business when the accident occurs. So if you paid your dues for the 2019 year, before the end of December, I thought you might want to know how to enroll in the coverage. You only need to enroll one time as long you keep paying your dues between 1-July and 31-December each year. Seventy-fifth anniversary of the "Second Battle of Guam"

On July 21, 2019, Liberation Day will be celebrated on the island of Guam, as it is each year, much like Independence Day on the mainland U.S., with parades, parties, and fireworks. Liberation Day in Guam this year will commemorate 75 years since the "second battle of Guam". As an American territory, Guam is located in the western Pacific, about 3300 miles from Hawaii. After the Japanese sneak attack on Pearl Harbor of Dec 7, 1941, it was only a scant few hours when they overtook Guam, and then The Philippines, which at the time was also an American territory. Both Guam and The Philippines had become territories of the U.S.as a result of the Spanish-American war of 1898.

The Japanese faced minimal resistance in December of 1941, as they quickly over-ran the island. For the next two and a half years they were demanding and cruel conquerors, and responsible for forced labor, torture, rape, and even beheadings of the citizens of Guam. Bad memories for the few remaining oldest residents. As the Admiral Nimitz-led forces advanced across the Pacific during the war, plans were made to retake Guam. An estimated 18,000 Japanese were killed in the battles that followed, from July 21 until Aug 10, while less than 500 surrendered. After holding out in the jungle for 28 years, one last Japanese soldier Shoicho Yokoi surrendered in January, 1972.

Jayne Flores is a resident of Guam. Jayne is the daughter of long-time Legion 43 member Al Rechenmacher, and a cousin of Mike and Bob Rechenmacher, Kathy Thornton, and numerous additional Rechenmachers. In 1982 while employed as a TV reporter in downstate Quincy, she tired of Illinois winters, and seeking a more comfortable climate, accepted a similar position in Guam, where the average temperature hovers in the mid-80's.

Now married with 3 adult daughters and some grandchildren, she was in Naperville for Thanksgiving to visit with her father, and I had an opportunity to meet with her on Nov 23. She told me much about Guam. With a population of around 164,000, most of the economy is built around tourism (75% Japanese), and the military (Naval Base Guam) and (Andersen Air Force Base). Since most supplies must be imported, living costs tend to be rather high. Vulnerable to tropical storms, most housing is now built of concrete. The married daughter with children lives in Guam, another lives in Portland, and the third in San Diego.

She told me that Guam has the highest per capita rate for U.S. enlistments in the Armed Forces. It sounds as if Guam is an okay place to live! Happy "Liberation Day" to all the Guamanians, as they commemorate the Seventy-fifth year of another victory for the "Greatest Generation", to whom we are all so eternally grateful!

Chaplain's Corner

As we say good-bye to 2018, two articles appeared in December that I feel has captured our Nation's mood and the Spiritual Challenges that lay ahead. On Thursday, December 13th the Daily Herald headline read, "Some Say Halt Prayers at County Board Meetings." Apparently newly elected officials of the DuPage County Board question the now decades long tradition of opening and closing board meetings with prayer. They claim that there should be a separation of church and state. County Board Chairman Dan Cronin remarked, "DuPage has always made an effort to bring people from all faiths to perform the invocation." County board member Tim Elliott from Glen Ellyn agreed by stating, "I believe that people up there of different faiths is a sign of respect for our diversity. Faith, Elliott goes on is an important component for the vast majority of our citizens. To celebrate that is important," according to Elliott. Separation of church and state the naysayers shout out! Well tell that to George Washington as he led the Army of the Potomac into many battles for our independence recognizing the importance of faith and trust in God! He also stated in his 2nd Inaugural Address that our nation would not survive if not for God's protection and the faith of its people! Our nation has just completed one of the most divisive years in our history. We have witnessed a hostile Congress, political parties that can't resolve differences and a lack of tolerance for hearing out the views of others. God has been asked to take a back seat to those who supposedly have greater wisdom. As Sarah Palin once said, "Say how's that been working out for you lately?" What is needed is greater compassion, seeking out God in prayer, be better listeners of each other and in 2019 when we express a belief or defend a point of view lets do it with love and respect. We all need to kick back and be a little kinder and more understanding with each other.

Now, the 2nd story that caught my attention was with reference to the Bladenburg Peace Cross, which has stood in Prince George's County in Maryland for almost 100 years. The monument was built by The American Legion and women who lost their husbands and sons in WWI. Many of the families never received the remains or ashes of loved ones they lost in the war. So, this monument has served as the only place they are able to pay their respects and honor the 49 local men who made the ultimate sacrifice in serving their country during WWI. The American Humanist Association is challenging in the Supreme Court this Memorial Peace Cross as a longstanding historic symbol of sacrifice, honor and respect not only for Maryland Vets but stands as a solemn salute to all veterans! It is this 1st Amendment right and American history that these anti-Christian forces are attempting to tear down. What is at stake in this court battle says The American Center for Law and Justice which is defending the case is that every "religious" symbol that offends one person or the anti-religious atheists, every monument, marker and statue throughout the country from Arlington National Cemetery to Naperville could be at risk should the court rule that the cross must be removed. So, our country's strong religious heritage is under attack right now as you are reading this. God is being forced out of our government, communities, military and even our schools! It will continue if we let it. So, please be in prayer that this first amendment case that the high court will hear in 2019 will not allow atheists who are "upset" over this cross to tear it down. What they don't get is that tearing down that Maryland cross dishonors all veterans who served and America's rich heritage.

Now, I wish all of the Post 43 family a very happy and blessed holiday season and a most meaningful 2019. Remember, the greatest joy to be experienced not only at holiday time but year around is when you reach out to help somebody or do a kind and thoughtful act for the other guy, without expecting anything back in return! See you in the New Year, and GO BEARS – GO BEARS!!


