We have been invited to numerous vehicle parades to support Veterans who were celebrating a significant birthday or other major event. On 2 May over 25 Riders rode in a birthday parade for a young grandson of a WWII Veteran. He is a big supporter of the military and it was a joy to see

On 8 May we rode in a birthday parade for Army Veteran Don Huston who was celebrating his 80th birthday. On 16 May the Riders rode in honor of WWII Marine Veteran and former POW Howard Chittenden, who was 100 years young. We also rode on 27 June for a birthday parade in honor of WWII Veteran Harry Gronli, who was celebrating his 95th year on earth.

Since the Riders are socially distancing and outdoors both the Naperville Legion and VFW asked us to handle many of the Memorial Day activities. Riders assisted in placing and removing American flags at both major Naperville cemeteries. We also had the great honor of placing wreaths at 10 different memorials in Naperville. This was one of the most significant activities your Riders have ever been asked to do. We thank the Legion and the VFW for trusting us with this mission. The final wreath we placed was at the VN memorial on North Mill street just north of Mill Street school. We had the privilege of having Jayne Luebke ride on the back of one of our bikes. Her brother, John Charles Luebke Jr. was killed in action by small arms fire on 24 July 1968. He was a member of the US Army's 1st Calvary Division and received a Combat Infantry Man's Badge and a Purple Heart among other awards. The Mill Street VN memorial is named in honor of him. That final stop was very emotional for all of us as we watched Jayne place the wreath at the VN memorial. Many wet eyes were noticed.

Recently the Riders participated is a very unusual event. Ken Mores put us in contact with members of the Spring Meadows Senior Living Facility "Hardly Davidson" riders group. Yes you heard that correctly-Hardly Davidson Riders Group. They even had T-shirts made up with their Hardly Davidson logos. About a dozen of the residents who have mobility scooters lead us in a parade that was well attended by many of the residents. The scooters were decorated with patriotic items and the crowd waved flags and were very enthusiastic. It was a great time for us Riders. We even stayed and talked to the



residents for about 20 minutes after the event. We told them to invite us to their parties as they sure seemed to know how to party. Thanks Ken for linking us up to this great, fun event.

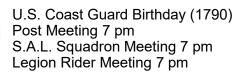

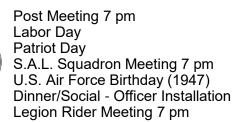

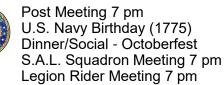
























Coffee's cancelled for an Indefinite period of time!

#### **WE ARE LIVING IN INTERESTING TIMES!**

Like it or not these are uncharted times of uncertainty that we find ourselves navigating our lives through. The last several generations of Americans have never experienced the extended disruption to their lives that



started in the Spring, and now continues into the summer of 2020. This slowdown in the pace of our lives has, I believe, also created a time of self-examination; an honest self-inventory of where our lives are heading including our faith values, relationship to God and family or career and financial decisions lying ahead. Should I return to school or my job in 2020? Is it really safe to do so now? How can I best serve others needs when we are social distancing, wearing masks, and still not allowed to meet on a regular basis? This old Chinese proverb I referred to earlier was spoken by a British diplomat serving in China in 1936 and resurfaced in a speech by Robert Kennedy in 1966. So, how can we all cope during this crazy time and find some value and purpose in daily life, despite an uncertain future? Did you WWII, Korean, Vietnam, and Gulf War Vets ever imagine that after bravely serving your country, defending its cherished values and flag that you would be facing yet another unexpected deadly enemy; a contagious coronavirus? Some of you WWII Vets may still have memories of your family going through the Spanish Flu outbreak of 1919. Well this event has certainly become a 100 year game changer!

There are some steps we can all take right now that some of us have found to be full-filling and worthwhile. Place an overdue phone call to a friend in need. To just hear your voice or to just pray regarding a specific need might be such a blessing, and hesitancy about calling in the first place, will be replaced by the good feeling in your heart for having reached out. Sending an e-mail or a personal letter from you to another person who is struggling with the emotional and financial impact of the coronavirus, or hosting a Zoom online meeting of family, friends or shut-ins who are missing outside contact, are all great ways of showing you care and here is a little secret. It leaves you with a good feeling and gets you to start thinking about others rather than focusing on yourself. Even sending out a humorous card or passing on a humorous joke or story or updated family pictures or supporting a new charity could be such a welcome surprise for someone to know that you are thinking about them and care about their lives. Now, this Chaplain and several other like-minded people of faith I have spoken to over the past 4 months generally agree that God did NOT cause this virus but has allowed it to spread across the world. Why? Because a loving God is trying to get our attention! For decades now we have driven God out of our schools, businesses and government. The 10 Commandments are outdated, our constitution has become by some an "irrelevant" document. There are no moral absolutes. God never granted they say to us as written in the Constitution certain unalienable rights such as life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. Prayer is seen as a waste of time and thereby foolish with no relevant purpose. Relativism tells us to create our own moral code. That if it works for me that's okay as long as someone doesn't criticize my views and interfere with my lifestyle or my concept of religion. To tell me you are a Christian and speak only of the Bible, Jesus and God is hate speech and is to be condemned because it speaks only of God's moral code which rejects this new religion of relativism. Let me ask you a question. For a personal moral code to work whose standard of morality should we embrace to live our lives? A new and dangerous radical agenda blatantly ignores and even rejects God's impact on America throughout its history. Just a couple weeks ago our "Godless press and media" mocked and called "irrelevant and foolish" Vice-President Pence gathering his Coronavirus Task Force for a prayer session.

True American History records all of the signers to our foundational documents, The Declaration of Independence and Constitution, all to a man believed that God would need to be at the center of the new American Republic; directing the affairs of men for the United States to survive. 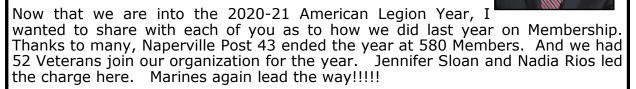

### August - Another Month Rich in History

At first glance, August seemed to lack the numerous events in military history that fill other months. But a closer look shows this is a month that contains many significant milestones.

To start at the "way back," Colonial forces won the Battle of Bennington on Aug. 16 1777. During the conflict that took place on the Vermont-New York border, the Stars and Stripes flew for the first time in a land battle that is considered a key victory in the Revolutionary War.

On Aug. 4, 1790, the forerunner of the U.S. Coast Guard – the Revenue Cutter Service – was formed and became an effective weapon battling pirates in the Caribbean.

On a sadder note, the Navy abolished the weekly rum ration on Aug. 31, 1862. In place of the issue of 1.5 pints of rum, "dry" seamen received a 5 cent per day allowance.

On Aug. 2, 1909, the Army accepted the Wright Flyer as its first airplane after a trial during which the craft flew for more than one hour and achieved a speed of 42.5 miles per hour.

On the first day of this month in 1949, the Army began training its first paratroops at Hightstown, N.J. The unit consisted of 45 men and two officers, later to be expanded after authorization by the War Department.

Some 11,000 men of the  $1^{st}$  Marine Division landed on the Pacific island of Guadalcanal on Aug. 7, 1942, marking the first offensive action by the U.S. in the region. Six months of fighting followed.

On Aug. 5, 1943, the War Department organized the Women's Air Force Service (WASPS) to ferry planes from factories to airfields and freeing male pilots for combat.

The Enola Gay, a B-29 bomber, took off on Aug. 6, 1945, to drop the first atomic bomb on Hiroshima, destroying more than half of the Japanese city and initially killing some 80,000 people.

Two Air Force F-100s completed the first flight by jet fighters over the North Pole, landing at Eielson Air Force Base, Alaska, on Aug. 7, 1959, completing a 5,405-mile, 9-hour, 37-minute trip that began at Wethersfield, England.

Marking one of the low points of the Cold War, the East German government closed the border between Berlin's east and west sectors on Aug. 13, 1961, eventually erecting the 12-foot high concrete Berlin Wall. The wall was demolished at the end of 1990.

Aircraft from USS Constellation (CV 64) and USS Ticonderoga (CV 14) launched the first naval strike on North Vietnam on Aug. 5, 1964, in retaliation for attacks three days earlier on two U.S. destroyers.

On Aug. 30, 1983, Lt. Col. Guion Buford became the first Black American in space, launching on the shuttle Challenger from Cape Canaveral on a six-day mission.

The Iraqi army invaded Kuwait on Aug. 2, 1990, an event that was followed just five days later by President George Bush's order for Desert Shield.
